DEVERELL'S CLOTHING STORE DAMAGED

Tho damage to the stock from both fire and water was large. The contents throughout the whole interior of the store were more or loss damaged. Mr. Heverell estimates his loss at \$1,000. This was the amount of the insurance of the stock in the Merchants Fire Insurance Company. The building, which is bwned by Mr. Cummings, of Stratford, is insured in the Wellington for \$2,000. The loss on it has been adjusted at \$100.

The origin of the fire is a mystery. Mr. Deverell has no idea of the cause. 
