From July to December 1913, there were in Petrograd alone 97 suicides, but between the same dates in 1914 suicides were reduced to 14.

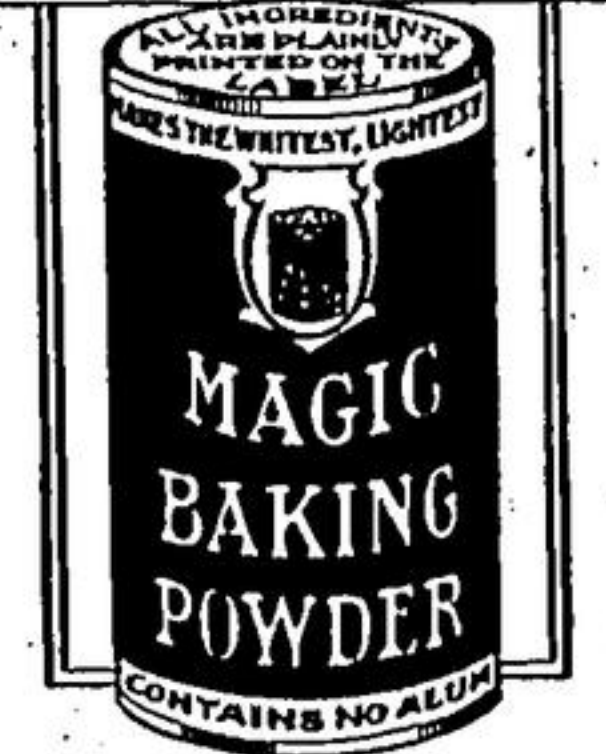

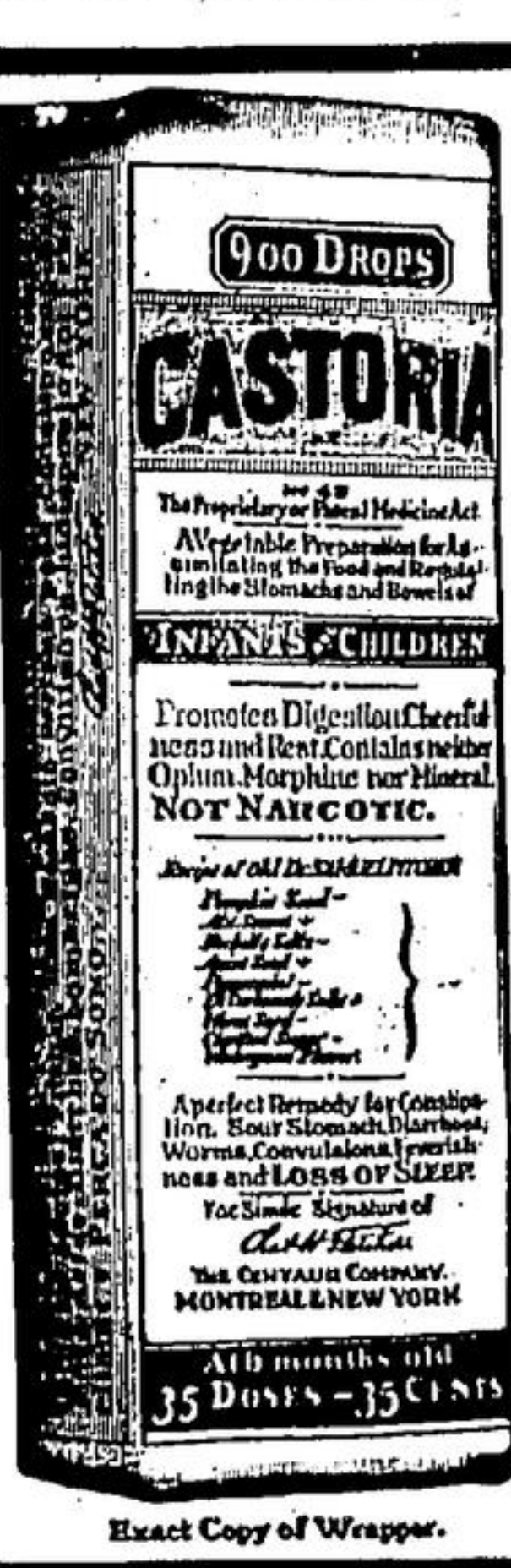
