For the benefit of our readers we publish the provisions of the Militia Yaw as fol ows : The male population from 18 to 60, not exempted or disqualified by law, and being British subjects by birth or naturalfration, may be called upon for service. The male population so liable to serve in the militie shall bedivided into four classes. The first shall comprise those of the age of 18 years and upwards, but under 30

years, who are unmarried or widowers without children. The second class shall comprise those of the age of 30 years and upwards, but under 45 years, who are unmarried or widowers without children.

The third class shall comprise those o the age of 18 years and upwards, but under 45 years, who are married, or widowers with children. The fourth class shall comprise those 45 and under 60. And the above shall, be the order in which the male population
