PROMIDITION LEGISLATION appears to be a popular theme for provincial speeches from the throne. This tenic was referred to favorably in the speech at the opening of the Ontario House, and when the British Columbia House opened last Thursday the Lieutenant-Covernor said: "A measure to provide for the probibition of the sale of liquor will be presented to the Youse."

INSTRUCTOR DRHYES calls the attention the School Trustees of the county in his annual report to the fact that new regulations this year introduce into the schools a new series of texts books which will form the basis of systematic moral training. These are the Golden Rule Books calculated to furnish material for the direct and indirect inculation of the highest ideals in the hodily, intellectual, social, sconomic, civio and assthatic life.

CANADIAN BANKS are arranging for predit to the British government by means of which some \$75,000,000 worth of munitions will be contracted for herein addition to the enormous purchases already made. This step is not only important for its direct bearing on the war, but will secure for Canadian manufactures profitable buslasse that will engage them for many months to come. It will thus reflect on the whole financial and commercial community.
