The indications now are that the government will enact prohibition through a bill in the legislature and make it subject to epeal on a straight majority vote after the ver. If the measure were to be passed by vote of the legislature, it could also be revoked by the legislature, while if peaced by the people it would be for the people to repeal it. The government our adopt the legislature method without causing the criticians that the country is being divided during the present crisis.

The feeling among members of the lagisature seems to be that in view of the vote in Manitolia, it would be a waste of money to put on a referendum during the war.
