Early Household Effects in Ontario Were Very Primitive. The hardy ploneers who

peopled Ontario had little to boan of in the way of furniture. A chest of drawers, a favorite chair, perhaps a table formed their entire stock when they entered the virgin forest. Everything else was of home manufacture. For a bedstead, there was a platform of poles across one and of the room, about two feet above the floor, supported by inserting the ends between the logs in the wall. Rough benches with four logs served us scats, and a table was similarly constructed on a larger scale. Later when lumber was obtainable, these articles of furniture were re-

sauled out at night. The kitchen arrangements were also of the most primitive sort. At first the only cooking device was a bake kettle which hung over the States on the bake-kettle VICTORIA DAY was supermeded by the redector. which was an oblong box of bright tin, enclosed on all sides but one.
