liable, for they are hased upon scientific state for personal or family ponsumption. What is the effect of such partial probibition? The result has been that under prohibition we are spending on liquor only one par cent. of the average for the U. S. Under the license system the liquor of the state was not less than thirty million dollars. The liquor of Beattle alone was a million dollars a month. Now the whole state is spending only about three hundred thousand a year. Of course the money that was worse than wasted in drink is now spent in wearing anyurel, table supplies, and other useful articles. There is far more domestic comfort than there was,
