REORGANIZATION ARREST.

Ontario Boards of Tende Want Better Porest Protection.

Twenty-two of the leading Boards of Trade of Ontario have made representations to the Ontario Government for a reorganization of its forost protection system. The Boards have specified two reforms: the reorganization of the rangers so as to provide for supervision and inspection, both In the

head office and the field; secondly, that the Government should make some effort to keep down the timber damage resulting from settlers' clear-

For the latter purpose, it has been suggested that a system of "permila" lasted by fire rangers to settlers intending to burn slash in the neighborhood of forcuts, should be tried out in a few localities, so as to determine the best procedure. The Permit system has been successfully operated in Quebec and British Columbia for several years. It has not antagonized the acttler, while saving

The widespread demand for a general reconstruction of Ontario's forest protection plan is finding aympathotic consideration by the Minlater of Lands and Forests, who during the past year has been exceedingly busy with other special duties. The present forest guarding system of the province has been retained for a great many years practically without alteration. It is complained that the rangers, while numerically suffireligiond supreme. Forest ranglug, secording to modern practice, requires skilled men and skilled overseers, or the expenditure of public money is considerably wasted. The proposals of such bodies as the Commission of Conservation, the Canadian Forestry Association and their supporters, is that the forest guardlug system of Ontario be placed under a special qualified officer of the department, who will have nu-

thority to rebuild the present sor-The second proposition, as out lined by the Boards of Trade, is that the rule to valuable timber tracts caused by settlers' fires should be pur under some form of control. British Columbia and Quebec now probibit a settler in a forested district from setting out a clearing fire until he has consulted a forest rang or. The ranger is nearly always close at hand and advises the farmer to pile his slash in the middle o his clearing, not against standing timber, and not to select a dry or windy day for applying the torch. With these simple instructions followed, he issues a permit good for a number of days. ## HOW TO KEEP WELL

CONHUMPTION.

TOWN BROWN had noticed for some time that he was not up to the mark. In the morning he felt very well, but through the day he became tired, sleepy, and a little feverish. He had had a slight tickling cough for a month or two, but did not cough up anything. One afternoon he felt a warmth bohind his breastbone, and at the same time in had a suity taste in his mouth. Following a tickling in nis throut he coughed and brought up a few teaspoonfuls of bright red blood. This playmed his friends very much, and he turned pate, his hands were cold and perapiration broke out on his forehead. A .- The Public Health Act, Bection 89, Sub-Section 1 and 2, refers to

this question as follows:-"As .- (1) If any person coming from abroad, or rentding in any municipality within Onturio, is infected, or has recently been infected with or exposed to, any communicable disease to which this section is by the Regulations made applicable, the medical officer of health or local board shall INFECTED PERSONS make effective provision for the public safrty by

removing such person to a separate bouse, or by otherwise isolating him, and by providing medical attendance, medicine, nurses, and other assistence and seressaries for him. "(2) The corporation of the municipality shall be entitled to recover from such person the amount expanded in providing such medical attendance, medicine, nurses, and other assistance and necessaries for him, but not the expenditure incurred in pro-

viding a separate house or in otherwise isolating him. 2 Oco. V. c.58, a.58." The communicable disesses referred to in this sections are: Smallpox, scariet for a diphtheria, chicken-pox, whooping-cough, messles, typhold faver, cholera bubonic plague, leprosy, epidemio anterior-polio-myclitia, and coidemic corebro-spinal maningitia.

Wasten Half a Million Pounds Every Week. Wasterin any form is extravagance, but when the material represented by waste constitutes a severe drain upon the natural resources of our country. It is all the more to be deprecated. To-day all the countries in the world are auttoring from a serious shortage of paper-making material. to overcome this shortage, they are drawing heavily upon Canadian suppiles, and one large Canadian manufacturer advisor that this increased demand will result in an early shortage in Canada. This is especially true of waste paper, such as old nowspapers, magazines, wrapping paper, etc. This stock is used in the manufacture of the cheaper grades of paper, building paper, turred felt patent roofings, miliboard, and fill ing for cardboard, etc. There are at

present three mills in Canada using reclaimed paper exclusively in their manufacturing. Canada is wasting fully 500,000 pounds of paper weekly without any reasonable excuse. It is estimated that a ton of wood-pulp requires eight trees, averaging hine inches at the butt. To replace this waste of paper stock, therefore, necessitates the cutting of approximately 3,000 trees weekly or over-100,000 amudal-

y in Canada's forests. As an illustration of what may be accomplished when waste paper is saved and systematically collected, the results secured by the Daughters of the Empire at Ottawa may be rited. In Hoptember last this organization undertook to collect wante paper, the proceeds from its sale to be used for patriotic purposes, filmes this collection was instituted, approximutely 15 tons have been securt mouthly, composed almost entirely of old nawspapers, which had been previously burned or otherwise de-

The satisfactory results indicate that there is room for a considerable e-largement of this project. It is work that might be undertaken by municipal charities for the purpose o" accurring funds, or by other Interonts with a popular object in view. Trun, there are certain dealers carrying on this industry at present, but tory have falled to secure the support of the public, which is necessary to the plan of saving the paper from the homes and delivering it to designated places.

When every effort is being made conservo our forests, to protest them from the ravages of fire and wasteful lumbering methods, the public should give more attention to saving their old papers and to simllar conomies which may reduce the drain upon our forests and other resources .- Conservation.

The stand of merchantable timber in British Columbia is estimated to reach the enermous total of four hundred billion feet (400,000,000,-000) board measure, which is over half the total of all Canada. The annual cut is, at present, in the olillon foot (1,800,000,000) board mensure. The foresta can, therefore, supply indefinitely a yield considerably greater than that. British Columbia's location and export facilities domand that every offort be made to necure a full share of the export lumber trade, but the main murkots for British Columbia forest products are on this continent.

In proportion to population, Canada uses more lumber than any other country. Eastern Canada constitutes a natural field for the expanaion of Brittah Columbia's lumber markets, particularly now that the Pastama Canal renders direct water shipmont possible. The forest areas of Eastern Canada are already up able to supply the local demand. This is clearly shown in the official returns of imports.




