EDITORIAL NOTES

THE BAPTIST CONMENTION in session a Hamilton on Monday passed a resolution calling upon the Dominion Government to pass logislation prohibiting the importation, manufacture and sale of liquor for hoverages in the Dominion.

Attempts at law-breaking to discredit prohibition will be resolutely handled.

THE FOCUSING of public attention in Canada upon the problem, of strongthening our national organization through increated industrial and commercial efficiency lands special value and interest to the Saventh Annual Report of the Commission of Conservation, which has just been issued. The activities of this Commission, relating to the entire field of primary production, aim to secure greater efficiency in basic industry-in the development and utilization of Canada's natural resources. The report, which is bound in cloth, and well illustrated, constitutes an important addition to the literature on Canada's resources und the problems connected with their efficient administration and development.


