You can hear to have your pocket emptied of a few dollars for the Hospital's war fund—the fund that helps the Hospital save the lives of little children, including the children of our own country.

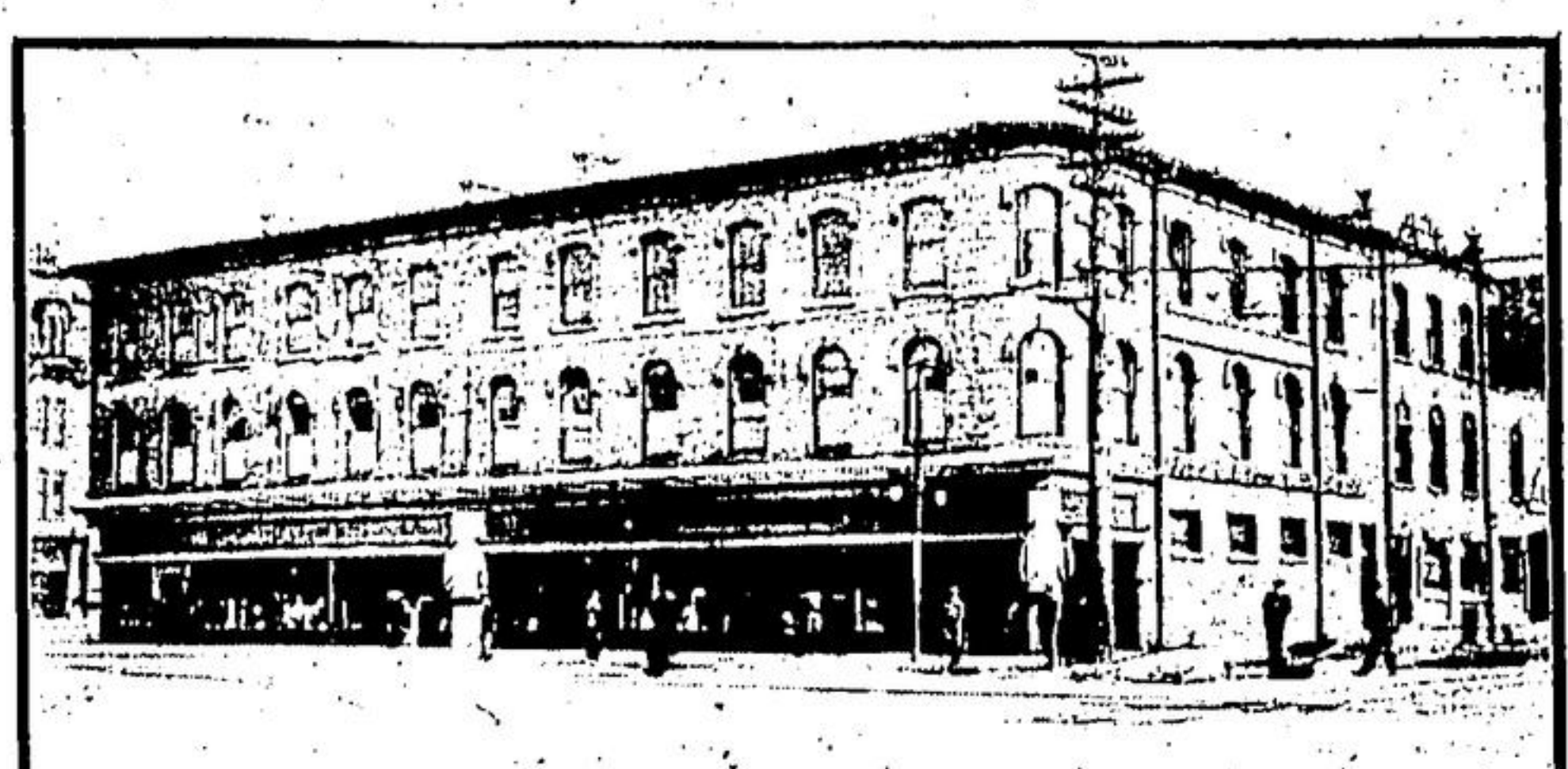
