THE METHOD of war adopted long ugo was wisely chosen, because of its value in accomplishing results with the least possible antagonism to cherished privileges The British tradition of the sanctity of citizen's home was not assailed by legislation that prohibited the liquor ovil. With respect to the same tradition society has prohibited traffic in unwholesome foods commerce in gambling, or prolit-making by Indiscriminate cale of poisonous drugs or the flesh of diseased animals. IF ANYONE has had any doubt as to the astness of our caute in the present war, or as to the need of supporting it by all the means in our power, the ground for those doubts has now disappeared. On the last day of January, Germany issued to the world notice to the effect that all shipping that does not comply with certain rules that Germany has laid down, will hereafter be sank without warning. This betrays the true nature of the madness with which the Germans began the war in the first place. The real point at issue is now made as clear as the sun. It is barbarism against civilization, and already many boats have been sent to the bottom and many non-combatants have been taken. Ottawa on the 7th of February, when the House of Commons abjourned, the Pri me Minister and Sir Willrid Laurier both expressed this point. Sir Robert Borden mid: "The renewal of the Tucton submarino campaign with all its barbarous methods and the practical enslavement of the Belgian people should merely steel and strongthen Canadian resolution. Canada's work in the war is not concluded." Sir Wilfred Laurier, leader of the Opposition expressed the same sentiments and said that in regard to the war, be shared to the full the sentiments expressed by the Leader of the Covernment. The cynically ruthless violation of Relgium and the atrocities of the Germans had satisfied the world that there should be but one end to the struggle -"such a victory for civilization as will make recurrence of such 'outrages unknown in the generations to come." The people of Canada are a unit in the conviction that a grave responsibility now rests upon us. and the people of Canada are looking to the eligible men to do their duty and to calist for the defences of the greatest national cause that anyone now living will over be able to support.


