Mr. McGarr introduced a bill on this matter which provides that all soldiers, whether of the legal age of twenty one or not will be given a vote. The Liberals thoroughly concurred in this proposal and in the opinion that man who is old enough to right for his country is also old-enough to vote. Other things mentioned in the Speech from the Throne were proposed legislation to provide for the settlement of returned soldiers upor the land ; to provide for cortain farm loans relating to hydro electric development and to regulate co-operative societies.
