HOW TO KEEP WELL

RECEPES FOR HARY FOOD, ETC

Limo Water. PRASPOONFUL of unstaked lime in a quart of boiled water. "Thake in a large bottle such as a gem jar and let stand for twentyfour hours. The clear fluid standing on top may then be run off. This is Lime Water,

Barley Water. Two level teaspoontule of flobinson's or Brook's barley-flour. Mix with water to make a paste. Add water to one pint. Bell for twenty minutes in double baller. Strain through two thicknesses of cheese cloth. Add boiled water to make up that holled away so as to have one plat.

Oatment or Barley. Use either Robinson's or Brook's barley flour or Robinson's Datmonl (growte). Take three tempsonfuls of the four. Add quilicient cold water to form a paste and add enough water to make a pint Cook for twenty minutes in a double-botter. Add a pinch of sait. Strain through two thicknesses of checsocloth. The gruet should be thick enough to Jully when cold. If too thin, cook longer.

To one quart of skimmed milk, heated to 105 Deg. F. add four teaspoonfuse of l'quid rennet. Let stand in a cool place till the curd forms. Break up the curd with a fork and strain through four layers of cheesecloth or mustin. -Heat the liquid (whey) to 165 Deg. F. and allow to cool grad-

ually. Keep on ice. One quart of milk makes 24 ounces of whoy. Albumen Water. To four ources of water, heated to 104 Deg. F. add the white of one egg, stir with a knife-until dissolved. Do not beat or shake. Strain through

Put a pound of meat in one pint of cold water. Add a pinch of salt. Cook allowly for three or four hours. Strain through two thicknesses of cheereclest and cool. Remove all the fat

Partially brotl over coals, both sides of a half pound of the top of a round of beef. Cut in amail pieces and squeezo out the juice, using a meat

press or worden lemon squeezer. Add a pinch of salt. Half a pound of boot aves two ouncer of beet julco. Scraped Boot.

Scrape a piece of round steak with a knife and then very slightly broll. Scraped boof is free from fibre and is better than minced boof.

To one quart of whole milk heated to 105 Deg. 1', add four teaspoonfuls liquid rennet. Add a pinch of salt and a teaspoonful of granulated sugar. Let stand in a cool place till the curd forms. Strain off the liquid. The balance is junket Coddled Egg.

Put the egg in boiling water and immediately remove from the fire. Cover and let stand for seven or eight minutes. The white of the egg should be soft and not liquid.

Take half a pound of good prunes. Wash and soak in water over night. Cover with water and add half a teaspoonful of sugar. Cook in a double boller until the prunes are perfectly tender. Strain through cheesecloth, ing from a quarter to half an inch Soap Suppository.

Take a piece of castile or common brown seap and cut out a portio one or two inches long, pointed at one end and about as thick as a lead pencil. This will make a very good suppository. Slightly wet when about

Boracio Acid Solution (2 per cent.) Put one tablespoonful of-boracio acid trystals in a clean eight-ounce bottle filled with boiled water. Shake the bottle. Not all the crystals will no dissolved, but the water will be a saturated (4 per cent.) solution. Some of this diluted with equal parts of boiled water will be a 2 per cent, solution The 4 per cent solution should be so labelled and used as a stock solution

Up Before Planting.

SOME FIRST CROPS TO PUT IN

to Grow This Year-llow to Procood in Several Lines.

Having discussed the methods of proparing the garden soil to receive the seed we now turn to the sowing of the seed itself. There is no need to hurry the cowing of the seed. Hettor results will be obtained if the amatour gardoner will walt until the soil is warm and easily worked. The vogetables discussed are arranged as nearly as possible according to the time they should be planted. LETTUCE. Lettuce is grown for its leaves, and is our best known, salad plant. It is a short-soason plant, and is often grown to follow or procede another crop. It is quite hardy and may be planted quite early in the spring; grown to maturity, and followed with a tender crop such as fomatoes, or it may be plantod between any plants of the cabbage family. It is a good plan in a small garden to plant only a few foot at one time and follow this with suc-

should be thinned to stand two inches If one desires large single heads of fottuce the plants abould be thinned to stand from seven to nine inches apart. The thinnings may be transplanted to another part of the

garden. HADISH. The radiah plant is grown for its roots, which are esten raw just as soon as they are large enough to use. It is quite herdy, and may be planted very carly in the spring. Radishes are frequently sown with other crops which are not such rapid growers, such as pars-They should, however, be pulled out before the paranipe or other crops noed the ground. Succossive planting is also advised for this crop. Radish seed may be planted ip rows, four inches spart or broadcasted, the depth proferred beonly. Radish as a general rule roquire no thinning, and the soil betwoen the rows should be kept loose with the hoe. A crop of winter radish may be obtained if the seed is

apart. SPINACH. Spinach is a short season crop which is grown to provide table greens. The plant matures in about aix weeks from planting, and seed should be sown very carly in the spring, as the plants run to sood during the hot summer months. The seeds may be planted in rows or broadcasted, and should be sown at a dopth of one half inch. Successive planting may be made it so desired. When the leaves are large enough to use they may be pulled off or the

ONION. The onion is grown for seasoning, pickling, and for cating IAW. A large percentage of onions stored for winter use are grown from sood planted in the soil very early in the spring. The soil should be rich, moist and well drained, but fresh manuro-is not the best to apply. The scods should be planted at a depth of about one-half inch, and the rows should be from twelve to fourteen inches apart. The seed should be planted very thinly so that there will be no need for extra thinning of the onions. Cultivation should cease when the onion tops are such a sixe as to prevent cary work. In the full when the tops are about two-thirds

died down the onions should be pulled and laid in windrows so arranged that the bulbs are covered with the tops of the onlone. This provents any sunburn which causes considerable trouble in storage. After they have been kept in this position for five or six days they may be gathered up and placed in a slat box or basket and tied up some way so that the rain will not get at them and the wind will have plenty of chance to circulate around the bulbs. The tops may be removed from the onions at this time if so desired, or they may be left cn. Dutch sets may be. planted as close together as they will stand in a straight row very

Peas may be planted very early in the season, and for the early crop the seed should be sown in a furrow of two inches deep and the soeds placed an inch apart. Some arrangements should be made so that the pen wines will have some support. . Limbs of trees or chicken wire may be used for this purpose, as the vines will cling to this for support and will be kept up from the ground. This support should be set proforably at the time of planting.

This soil should be drawn up around BEANS. Generally speaking, it is not'a good practice to add fresh manure to the soil where one expects to grow beans. They prefer a moist, deep loam. The seeds should be planted fairly carly in the spring. The rows being at least eighteen inches apart. A furrow two inches deep may be made with the corner of a hoe and the seeds placed from two to three inches apart in the bottom of this furrow. Another way which is sometimes followed in planting boons is to make holes two inches doop twelve inches apart and in each, hele three or four schols be placed. It is always advised not to touch the
