License Inspector Harvey is in receipt of a copy of the Amended Ontario Temperance Act in which there is an important clause in reference to records of shipments which must be kept by express companies and other carriers. Every railway company, express company and other common carrier shall keep or cause to be kept at each agency of such company where goods are received for shipment or are delivered, an accurate record of each consignment of iquor received and every delivery of liquor made by them or any of them or by their plarks, servants or agents, at or from such agency in a book to be kept for that purpose, and such record shall show the time when such liquor was received and the name and address of the person to whom the same was delivered, and the apparent kind and quantity thereof, and such record shall at all times be open only to the inspection of any inspector, provincial constable or provincial officer, but no information obtained in this manner by any such inspector or officer shall only be used for the purpose for which it was lawfully ob-


