NEWS TOPICS OF THE WEEK

WEDNESDAY.

The Austrian submarines were destroyed by Italian airmen who made a daring flight to Pola.

Captain Basil Hood, the famous British admiral, was found dead in his home in London.

The negro republic of Liberia in Africa has lined up with the Allies and declared war against Germany.

The French in their most recent offensive smashed two lines of the Crown Prince's front in the Champagne District.

Donald Henry McLan, of Oakville, who belongs to one of the best known families in Ontario, passed away in Toronto General Hospital.

Peterboro has established the first municipal coal yard in Ontario so as to safeguard the citizens against the danger of a coal famine next winter.

The military authorities, backed by a number of leading Ontario citizens, have formed a committee to fight the effects of the social evil in the Province.

The Admiralty learns that a German submarine attacked a Spanish fishing boat in the neighborhood of Bilbao, Spain, within Spanish territorial waters. Two of the crew were severely wounded.

Miss Edith Villard, of Napanee, has been left \$50,000 by Pte. Galloway, a soldier who died of his wounds after returning from the front. It was the culmination of a wartime romance.

Andrew Bonar Law, Chancellor of the Exchequer, introduced in the House of Commons a formal resolution authorizing the treasury to borrow another £250,000,000 on the security of the consolidated fund of the United Kingdom, and announced that a war loan bill for this purpose will be introduced within a few days.

In a speech winding up the debate on the corn production bill in the House of Commons, R. E. Prothero, president of the Board of Agriculture, pointed out that if the bill succeeded to the extent anticipated in adding to the home-grown wheat acreage, there would be released sufficient tonnage to bring from America the entire cotton supply required by Great Britain last year.

Canadian troops carried out an extensive raid on German positions defending Lens.

Fear is entertained that the steamer Waffle of Kingston, missing since Wednesday, is lost.

A new regiment has been organized for Ontario with Lieut.-Colonel McLaren as commandant.

Wm. Murray, a section hand on the N. St. C. & T. Railway at St. Catharines, was killed.

The Ontario Government increased the reward in the Lapello murder case to one thousand dollars.

Alex. M. Ferguson, a prominent Minto township farmer, died as a result of being kicked by a horse.

The Government bill to place the I. C. Railway under the Dominion Railway Board was discussed in the Commons.

Some isolated cases of farmers allowing crops to rot rather than pay wages demanded by help have been reported to the War Production Club.

Russian and Roumanian troops repulsed enemy attacks in the Troitsa Valley, and then launched vigorous counter-attacks, which gained them prisoners and captured machine guns, according to an official statement issued by the Roumanian War Office.

MONDAY.

Cadet Heyland, of Midland, was killed in an aeroplane smash at Camp Borden.

Dr. Spahn, who has been leader of the Catholic Centralist party in Germany, intends to retire.

Ex-President Taft of the United States is seriously ill at Clay Centre, Kansas, but will probably recover.

The Board of Control of Toronto has decided that the city will employ only returned soldiers in future.

Eight departments in the Toronto City Hall have promised to send 248 men out to the Ontario farms to work as harvesters.
