**COAL BILL \$200 HIGHER THIS YEAR**  
 The Board of Education had the important duty at its meeting on Monday evening of preparing and bringing down the estimates of receipts and expenditures for the year. With careful consideration every item was minutely scrutinized and it is fair to the Board to say that the estimates were pared down to the last possible dollar.

The ruling price of coal has caused an increase in the cost of heating for the year of \$200. The insurance on the buildings for the three years falls due this year, and other necessary expenditures are increased. The estimates are as follows:


