 The Italian Government has decided to manufacture a standardized shoe.  
 An attempt was made to assassinate Lord Atholstan of Montreal and his family.  
 An anti-draft meeting was held under the dome of the Capitol at Washington.  
 Two bodies from the wrecked schooner George A. Marsh washed ashore near Kingston.  
 Greater Toronto Labor party have nominated seven candidates for the next Federal elections.  
 Robert Boyd, for thirty-three years keeper of the Five-mile Light-house in the St. Lawrence River, died last night.  
 L. Ouellette, a farm hand, is accused of shooting Paul Merin, his wife and son, at Snake River, near Mattawa. The father and son are dead.  
 The Western Liberals by an overwhelming majority passed a resolution expressing admiration of Sir Wilfrid Laurier, "the greatest of all Canadians."  
 Wednesday, the first of three "Liberty loan" days in Russia, proved a great success. Automobiles paraded the streets of the capital and decorated booths were installed in the principal thoroughfares for the sale of the war bonds.  
 The Prussian franchise bill is to be introduced in the Diet in the immediate future. Chancellor Michaelis informed Herr Hirsch, one of the handful of Socialists in the Diet, when the member was received recently by the new head of the Government.

**TUESDAY.**  
 Ten thousand miners are idle in Illinois owing to a strike of drivers and motormen in the coal mines.  
 Aviator Martin of Winnipeg, who has been training at Deseronto, lost his life when his machine fell a thousand feet.  
 Captain William Avery Bishop, of Owon Sound, a Canadian aviator in France, has been awarded the Victoria Cross.  
 The Minister of Justice has introduced a bill in the House of Commons giving every soldier at the front and the military nurses votes at the coming election.  
 The Japanese mission to the United States has arrived on this continent. It is headed by Viscount K. Ishii, Ambassador Extraordinary and Plenipotentiary.  
 The body of Joseph Greater of Winnipeg was found buried in a hole on the homestead of Felix Letain of Dauphin. Letain is now facing a charge of murder.  
 Louis L. Cherry and Dr. Samuel Bernfield of New York, members of the exemption board, have been arrested charged with conspiring to exempt for pay men eligible for military draft.  
 The Washington Government has prohibited the export of airplanes except by special license. Neutral nations have been pouring in orders for American aeroplanes, and the order was made to conserve the supply.  
 The company which did the steel work of the Bloor Street Viaduct in Toronto, started in 1914 and now nearing completion, lost \$100,000 on the contract on account of the increase in the cost of material and labor since they made their tender.  
 Captain C. H. Dale of Toronto is reported killed. He has a unique military record. He enlisted on the second day of the war as a private and worked his way up to the rank of captain. He was invalided home and discharged as medically unfit for military service, but re-enlisted and went back to France.

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
