NOTES FROM MANITOBA

Interesting Details of the Growth of the Crops, the Harvest and other incidents

It was only a few weeks ago a great change has come over the face of the country. Instead of the beautiful fields of green growing grain, checkered off here and there by brown belts of summer fallow, a gloomy picture has become the prevailing picture. This is interspersed with the green of late oats, or a growth on the summer fallow. But another change has rapidly occurred and by the time those who see them will be rejoicing at the appearance of a vast encampment, with the rows and rows of conical-shaped stacks. Cutting variously commenced between August 12th and 20th, and is now in full swing. From early until late, with changing tenses, the reapers, by their paces on almost level ground, the crop is very good and the price is high, but fears are entertained that it may drop somewhat to \$2.00.

NEWS TOPICS OF THE WEEK

WEDNESDAY
The British battle in Flanders was hailed by a fervent gale. The speaker outlined the proposed new slave nation. Two day messengers in Chicago carried the news of the German advance. The Canadian Northern Railway purchase measure was put through the Commons under closure.

THURSDAY
Austria is faced by a serious coal famine. An Italian aviator established a new record for continuous flying. Prepare now for 1918 was the message sent by the War Production Club. A Russian division left its positions on the Roumanian front without firing. Exhibition Camp, Toronto, was designated for a "diers" training again next winter. Mr. J. M. Garbarino of Weston carried off two medals in the pony driving class at the Exhibition. Sir Robert Borden, according to a unanimous resolution of the Conservative caucus, remains head of the Government.

The Ontario Municipal Association sent a memorial to Ottawa requesting legislation for the control of streets now before the Senate. Miss Mead Hotten, a Parkhill school teacher, was drowned in Lake Huron, off Ipperwash Beach, Wednesday afternoon. The Duke of Devonshire opened a new wing at the Ontario Hospital for Consumptives and visited the various plants in the city connected with aviation. Sir Wilfrid Laurier accepted the Premier's invitation to name half of the Board of Selection to appoint one of the two members on each of the local tribunals under the Military Service Act. Martin T. Todd, well-known in transportation circles, president of the G. P. & H. Railway, and general manager of the L. O. Ry., and a prominent citizen of St. Paul, died in his 61st year.

The most serious street disturbances since New York has experienced an issue with the authorities, and a critic of the Government, occurred at an open-air meeting of the Friends of the League of Nations. The police had to fight their way through a turbulent, surging crowd in order to get their prisoners to the night court, where the uproar increased to such a point that the police were forced to be summoned to disperse the mob. General Curran, a well-known journalist of the city of London, and the Socialist Conference at Stockholm, said in a message to the British House, said in a message to the British House, said in a message to the British House.

FRIDAY
Great deeds of heroism were done by the Canadian soldiers in the battle for Hill 70. The British Commonwealth, was killed in an airplane accident. The Western Provinces Day at the Toronto Exhibition showed another increase in attendance. There was quite a stir in the recruiting throughout Canada following the signing of the Conscription Bill. The Canadian Northern Railway purchase bill was passed in the House of Commons by a vote of 53 to 37.

The Duke of Devonshire went to Camp Borden, and inspected Camp Borden, the aviation grounds of the Royal Flying Corps. Rev. Benjamin E. Parkinson of Toronto is now thought to be insane. He has been removed from the police cells to the hospital.

The Women's Auxiliary to the Ontario Resources Committee decided to ask the Food Controller to condone the sale of bread to invalids. Speaking to the Ontario Municipal Association, Hon. W. D. McPherson, chairman of the Soldiers' Aid Committee, said soldiers' families must be well looked after to avoid reprisals after the war.

After the destruction by fire of an important factory in the Ogita quarter of Petrograd, a started in another great industrial disaster. The Hydro by-laws were carried in Picton, Wellington, and Bloomfield, with voters aggregating 722 for and only 10 against. President Wilson's reply to the Pope has silenced the pacifists.
