EDITORIAL NOTES

HAROLD CONSERVATIVE executive not in Milton last Thursday afternoon, when election matters were discussed. A new candidate must be chosen to succeed the Hon. David Henderson and choice would appear to rest between Sir Thomas White and Dr. Nixon, M. P. P., though ex-Mayor Smith, of Burlington, is also regarded as a strong man for the party.

FOOD COURTEAU: RUMOURS OF GREAT BRITAIN SAY: "Now can afford to limb the profits derived by those engaged in the food industries of the United Kingdom. We examine the books and apply a system of cost and expense. I expect to hear that Mr. Hoover and Mr. Hamm have taken similar steps, so that we will be able to assure the people that the existing high prices of imported food do not represent profiteering."

REMARKS REACHING HERE FROM THE AGRICULTURAL DISTRICTS IN WESTERN CANADA INDICATE THAT NO TROUBLE IS ANTICIPATED FROM INTERNAL LABOUR PROBLEMS AS A RESULT OF THE OPERATION OF THE MILITARY ACT. EXPERIENCE AT THE TIME OF THE HARVEST THIS YEAR, WHEN SUFFICIENT LABOUR WAS SUPPLIED THROUGH THE CO-OPERATION OF MANY PATRIOTIC FORCES IN ADDITION TO THE REGULAR SUPPLY, HAS CAUSED THE FARMERS TO VIEW THE PROSPECT WITH CONFIDENCE.

THE COUNCIL OF ENGLAND SOCIAL SERVICES CONVENTION, PREPARED OVER BY ARCHBISHOP MATTHEWS, PRIMATE OF ALL CANADA, PASSED A RESOLUTION LAST WEEK IN FAVOUR OF TOTAL PROHIBITION FOR ALL CANADA. WHEN THIS INFLUENTIAL CHURCH ADDS ITS GREAT STRENGTH TO THAT OF THE OTHER CHURCHES WHICH HAVE APPROVED FOR PROHIBITION THE LIQUOR BUSINESSES IN CANADA IS SURELY DOOMED. THE MANUFACTURE, IMPORTATION AND SALE OF LABORATORY LIQUORS WILL BE FORCED TO CEASE.

THE PROVINCIAL REVENUE FROM MOTOR LICENCES THIS YEAR IS EXPECTED TO EXCEED \$600,000. RETURNS TO DATE SHOW THAT 75,000 LICENSES HAVE BEEN ISSUED COMPARED WITH 60,000 LAST YEAR. THE INCREASE IN LICENSES HAS BROUGHT WITH IT A GAIN IN REVENUE OF APPROXIMATELY \$250,000. CONSIDERING THE EXTREMELY HIGH FEES OF GRADING THE INCREASE IN THE PURCHASE OF CARS IS REMARKABLE. THIS LARGE REVENUE SHOULD MEAN IMPROVED ROADS THROUGHOUT THE PROVINCE.

BUSINESS MEN THROUGHOUT THE COUNTRY ARE EXPRESSING THEIR SATISFACTION WITH THE SYSTEM OF MEDICAL BOARDS FOR "SELECTING MEN FOR MILITARY SERVICE EARLY, OF WHICH NOTICES HAVE BEEN GIVEN BY THE MILITARY SERVICE COUNCIL IN THE PROVINCE OF CANADA. THE SYSTEM WILL ENABLE EMPLOYERS TO TELL IN A COMPARATIVELY SHORT TIME HOW MANY OF THOSE WHO ARE EMPLOYED ARE HABILE TO BE DRAFTED AND WHAT MEN ARE NOT CONCERNED IN THE CALL. THE PHYSICAL TEST IS, OF COURSE, THE MOST IMPORTANT.

A NOVEL SUGGESTION WAS CONTAINED IN A RESOLUTION PASSED BY A GATHERING OF WOMEN AT WATERFORD THE OTHER DAY, AS FOLLOWS: "MOREOVER IF FINANCIAL RESOURCES ARE LIKELY TO BE A DECIDING FACTOR IN THE WAR, WE WOULD RESPECTFULLY URGE THAT THE ADVOCATES OF WIVES AND MOTHERS CONSERVING IN THE HOME SHOULD ADD TO THEIR PROGRAM OF CONSERVATION THAT ONE BE REQUIRED TO OBSERVE TWO SMOKELESS DAYS A WEEK UNTIL THE VICTORY IS WON." THIS IS A NATURAL DEDICATION FOLLOWING THE URGENT APPEAL OF THE MEN FOR THE ADOPTION OF RESTAURANTS AND WEAK DRINKS.

AMONG THE INDUSTRIES WHICH CANADA IS PLANNING TO FOSTER WHICH WILL ADD IN OFFSETTING THE CLUMP WHICH THE ABSOLUTE COMMISSION OF WAR ORDERS IS LIKELY TO BRING, ONE OF THE MOST IMPORTANT IS SHIPBUILDING, AND THE FACT THAT THE LARGE STEEL CONCERNS NOW ENGAGED IN TURNING OUT WAR SUPPLIES CAN DIRECT THEIR ATTENTION TO THE UPBUILDING OF THE DEPLETED COMMERCE-CARRYING FLEETS OF BOTH Belligerents and Neutral Nations should COMPENSATE IN LARGE DEGREE FOR THE LOSS OF WAR BUSINESS. THE ACUTE NEED OF STEEL PRODUCTS IN THE DEVASTATED COUNTRIES OF EUROPE WILL ASSERT ITSELF WHEN THESE POPULATIONS TURN TO THE WORK OF RE-CONSTRUCTION. THIS ALSO PRESENTS A FIELD OF ACTIVITY, OF WHICH CANADIAN AND AMERICAN FIRMS ARE PREPARED TO TAKE ADVANTAGE.

THE GUELPH HERALD VOICES THE OPINION OF HUNDREDS OF VISITORS TO ACTON FALL FAIR, YES, AND OF MANY MEMBERS, IN THE FOLLOWING PARAGRAPH: "THE POOREST PART OF THE HORSES IN THE RACE, AND IT WAS VERY EVIDENT THAT IF THIS PART OF THE FAIR IS TO BE MADE ATTRACTIVE TO THE PUBLIC, THE MANAGEMENT MUST OFFER MORE MONEY. THE HORSES ARE ONLY ONE RACE YESTERDAY, AND ONLY THREE HORSES IN THAT, AND THERE WAS NO INTEREST IN THE RACE. THE TRUCK WAS IN A GOOD SHAPE, TOO." THE SUM OF \$185 IS ALREADY OFFERED FOR THIS FEATURE, IT WOULD BE UNFAIR TO OTHER DEPARTMENTS AND ENTIRELY OUT OF PROPORTION TO THE VALUE OF THIS ATTRACTION TO OFFER ANY LARGER SUM FOR "TRAILS OF SPEED." THIS FEATURE WAS ORIGINALLY INTENDED TO ENCOURAGE FARMERS WHO HAVE GOOD TROTTING OR PACING STOCK TO TAKE AN INTEREST IN EXHIBITING ATTRACTIVELY THAT CLASS. IT HAS, HOWEVER, DEVELOPED, INSTEAD OF BRINGING TO THE FAIR A FEW OF THE POOREST OF THE PROFESSIONAL TRACK HORSES AND NEVER SUFFICIENT TO COMPLY WITH THE RULES GOVERNING THE FAIR. IF THE DIRECTORS WILL ADAPT THE PLAN OF PROVIDING SOME GOOD MORITORIOUS GRAND STAND ATTRACTION FOR NEXT YEAR, AND ONE HALF THE SEASON ALLOWED FOR PURCHASE AND THE COST OF PUTTING THE HALF-MILE TRACK INTO RACING CONDITION, THIS RESULT WOULD BE MUCH MORE SATISFACTORY TO THE PATRONS OF THE FAIR. IT WOULD PROVIDE A SUSTAINED INTEREST FOR THOSE WHO OCCUPY THE GRAND STAND, AND WOULD ALSO PROVE A REAL ATTRACTION TO BEING VISITORS TO THE FAIR.
