Tax Forms Income

Returns must be filed on or before 31st March THE Dominion Income War Tax Act requires you to fill in one or more of the five special Forms provided before 31st March, 1918. In order to assist the public to understand just what is required of them, information on each Form is given below. Read carefully, then get three copies of the form that fits your case and fill them in. Answer all questions fully and

Individuals.--All persons unmarried, and all widows or widowers without dependent children; whose income is \$1500 a year or more, must fill in Form T1. All other persons whose moome is \$3000 or more, use the same Form. Where any income is derived from dividends, list amounts received from Canadian and Foreign securities separately. Fill in pages 1, 2 and 3 only. Do not mark on page 4. Partnerships, as such need not file returns, but the individuals forming the partnerships must.

of the distribution of income from all estates handled must be shown as well as details of amounts distributed. A separate Form must be filled in for each estate. Employers must use Form T4 to give names and amounts of salaries, bonnes; commissions and other remuneration paid to all employees during 1917 where such remuneration amounted in the aggregate to \$1000 or over.

Corporation Lists of Shareholders.-On Form TS corporations shall give a statement of all

bonuses, and dividends paid to Shareholders residing in Canada during 1917 stating to whom paid.

Figures in every case are to cover 1917 income-all Forms must be filed by 31st March. For
