Income Tax Forms Are now available

Returns must be filed on or before 31st March.

THE Dominion Income War Tax Act requires you to fill in one or more of the five special Forms provided before 31st March, 1948.

Individuals.—All persons unmarried, and all widows or widowers without dependent children, whose income is \$1500 a year or more, must fill in Form T1.

Corporations.—On Form T2 corporations shall give a statement of all bonuses, and dividends paid to shareholders residing in Canada during 1947 ending to whom paid, and the amounts.

Employers must use Form T4 to give names and amounts of salaries, bonuses, commissions and other remuneration paid to all employees during 1947 where such remuneration amounted in the aggregate to \$1000 or over.

Trustees, Executors, Administrators of Estates and Assignees use Form T3. Full particulars of the distribution of income from trusts should be shown as well as details of amounts distributed.

Forms may be obtained from the District Inspectors of Taxation and from the Post-offices at all leading centres.
