Canada Food Dealers Licensed

Canada's new system of license control of dealers in foodstuffs involves the registration of about 2500 dealers. Of the total number of retailers there are 20,000 grocers, 16,000 butchers, 2,000 public eating places, 500 bakeries, 4,000 fruit and vegetable dealers and 2,000 produce dealers.
