Editorial Notes

The law enacted through the exigencies of war, abolishing hoarding should be made permanent, and the permanent adjournment of the kind of policies which has cursed this country in recent years would be one of the most beneficial by-products of the war.

The Grain Growers' Guide, published at Winnipeg, which has grown to be one of the most important publications on the continent in the farmers' interests, has just celebrated its tenth anniversary by issuing a mammoth edition of 100 pages. It abounds in interesting and timely matter and excellent illustrations. Prominence is given to various articles on the necessity of increased production and conservation at this time of national crisis. The Grain Growers' Guide is to be congratulated on attaining its 10th anniversary and on the splendid edition with which it is able to commemorate it.

The imperative necessity to reduce our consumption of wheat bread is upon every able-bodied person in Canada. In the course of nearly four years of the world war the grain hand of starvation has scrawled the names of more individuals on its altar than the hand of the most hardened bandit operating by gunpowder, gun and steel. Four million never hundred and fifty thousand persons have died from starvation while about 4,250,000 have been killed by fighting. Hunger gnawed at the vitals of Russia until her morale was so weakened that she collapsed. To the same cause may justly be attributed the crumpling of heroic little Roumania. Now the call has come from England, France, Italy, and Belgium that wheat must be forthcoming, or they cannot assure us that the allied armies or the morale of the sacrificing suffering millions behind the lines in those countries will be maintained. It is inconceivable that America should fall in this crisis. The various strains of our population cannot bear equally this reduction in consumption of wheat bread. To meet the needs abroad and prevent serious suffering at home it is imperative that all whose circumstances permit shall abstain from wheat and wheat products until the next harvest.
