**Post Restrictions Have been Removed**

Owing to the success of the bug and bird campaign in Canada and the United States, and the combined efforts of both countries in the consumption of pork, the Canadian Post Office has removed the restrictions applying to public places, the sale of pork of all kinds which may now be served at any time by such places operating under a Canadian Food Board Licence, except at the rate of 125,000,000 pounds per annum, or 41 per cent over the five year pre-war average.

**Just a Note of Warning**

Many boarding-house keepers and others engaged in the restaurant business in a small way have not yet taken advantage of the new law to be in the Canadian Post Office.

These parties are therefore liable to the penalty required by the regulations.

A public eating place subject to license, or a place where food is sold under No. 64, "Any place whatever where the meals to the number of fifteen or more per day are served or sold to persons that number, or family or household or the proprietor or caterer," persons supplying meals to the number as stated must obtain a license, otherwise they are liable to fine or imprisonment, or both.

Reduction of household consumption of sugar in Canada to a ration of one and one-half pounds per person per month is demanded. This has been requested by the Canadian Food Board in a statement just issued.

**Coin Regulations as to Prices**

The Fuzz Cartage Co. demands regulation of coin, which requires that every coin dealer shall post in a prominent place in his office a conspicuous typewritten or printed notice containing a list of the prevailing retail prices of all classes and sizes of coin handled by him, including discounts, if any.

**Sugar Must Not Be Hoarded**
