

ARM help is scarce, but this condition can be relieved to a marked degree by using machines that accomplish more work in a given time with less man power. Why should the farmer cling to horses a slow, expensive means of power-when every other business is adopting the truck and thereby reducing the cost of hauling, speeding up deliveries, and saving for human needs the food that

the horses would otherwise consume? The motor driven truck can work constantly at maximum load under the burning summer sun, or in the coldest weather. Unlike the horse it needs no rests while working, it cats only while in actual use, and when the day's work is done it requires very little attention, and leaves you free for other "Chores" about the place. Then, it can be housed in onequarter the space of the horses, wagon and harness it replaces. It is a mistaken idea that a truck is useful only for driving upon paved roads.
