

Getting Back Three Million

HE PAPER CONTROLLER for Canada a few weeks ago added \$12 a ton to the price of news print paper-the kind of paper used in the printing the Free Press. This addition, following closely upon several previous increases authorized by the Paper Controller, has meant to Canadian newspaper publishers a total increased publishing cost, in the matter of paper alone, in the past eighteen months, of three million

In connection with the earlier increases the readers of many daily newspapers have been required to pay \$1 or more per year for their newspapers, while the subscription price of very many weekly newspapers has been increased from 50 to 100%. In many cases still further increases will be necessary.

· But all the three million dollars increase in paper costs cunnot be loaded on readers; some of this sum must come from advertisers-this in the form of increased advertising rates. Advertising rates in Canada are, generally speaking, much lower per thousand of circulation than in the United States. Speaking on this point the editor of Marketing, a Canadian advertisers' newspaper published in Toronto, says in his last issue: "In meeting the Canadian publishers' calls for higher rates, advertising buyers should not fail to recognize that for years they have benefitted by the publisher's under-valuation of his space, and should be the more willing on that account to recognize the present necessities." To all of which the Free Press agrees.
