## Rousing Civic Welcome to Eight Returned Soldier Heroes

Mass Meeting of Citizens Expresses Hearty Sympathy With This  
Worthy Proposal for Soldiers' Memorial

## STRONG CITIZENS' COMMITTEE APPOINTED TO SUPERINTEND THE PROJECT

"The people of Acton proved again  
last Thursday evening that they are  
not as ready to assemble to accord a  
hearty welcome to the soldiers re-  
turning from overseas now as they  
did when their men first came  
through here after being invalided two  
years ago."

The town hall was crowded and the  
spirit of "Welcome Home" was in the  
air. It was a fine array of absent  
soldiers who had received great  
honor on the platform, backed by  
members of the Reception Committee.

There were eight men in this group of  
returned heroes. Every man of them  
had been in the front line and engaged  
in hot fighting with the enemy. Several  
of them carry serious  
wounds and disabilities and one mem-  
ber of this contingent, Mr. Harry  
Gullham, was awarded the Military  
Metal.
