Two or three lines of tile placed in position at transplanting leading well down under the roots will afford the most satisfactory method. All evergreen plants require special care in transplanting because of the

leaf surface exposure curing the entire year. They should be lifted with a ball of earth which should be kept intact and the tops sliguld be protected from the hot-sun and direct winds. April and May are the preferable months for transplanting all evergreens. They should never be transplanted in the


