Great War Veterans' Association Formed

Splendid Meeting of Citizens, Ad-
dressed by Major Nixon and
Secretary Turley

SUPPORT AND CO-OPERATION ID ASSURED

An splendid meeting was held in the town hall on Tuesday evening, when the need for and the aims of the Great War Veterans' Association were presented in many interesting and
eloquent addresses. Major Nixon, D.D.O., and Mr. C. of the Princess Patricia gave a vivid and interesting recital of the heroic experience of our brave men in the service of their country and Mr. Turley, Secretary of the Great War Veterans' Association, pointed out the aims, accomplished results and future plans of this organization.

The large audience was deeply impressed with the effectiveness of the Veterans' Association and the wide area of its operation.

Captain Torrance Beardmore occupied the chair. After selections by the orchestra, and splendid number by Mrs. Ethelreda Neale, who sang "The Queen of Empire" and concluded with an encore with a second well-rehearsed selection, he briefly stated the objects of the association and solicited the support and help of the people in furthering the interests of the veterans in view.

Major Nixon, the only original officer of the association, spoke at length, making a most interesting and instructive address. He said he had won no medals for making speeches. He certainly won the audience and Council second their efforts in certain charity work they were doing in Acton in their funds raised for this purpose were all used up.

The Council thought that as this organization was undeniably the best manner was to place the money in the hands of the veterans.

Moved by J. H. Lehman, seconded by J. Bell and resolved that the Council donate the sum of \$50.00 to the Daughters of the Empire, to be spent in their work in the community.
