It will be very agreeable to the general public learn that the postage on letters for Canada and th United States, not weighing over one ounce, is to be reduced to the pre-war rate of 2c. on and after the 1st of July next. Thus Dominion Day, 1919, will again be noted for a memorable event.

A Salvation Army campaign to take over saloop leases and fixtures in prohibition days, converting the deserted saloons into working men's clubs has been inaugurated in the United States. The plan contemplates retention of the lunch counter. But instead of selling liquor as the saloons have done, the Salvation Army clubs will handle coffee, soft drinks and the doughnut made famous by the organization during the war.
