FAITH—Heb. 11, 1-40; 12, 1, 2.
Matthew 23: 23-33; Mark 12: 40-42;
Rom. 14: 17; 1 Cor. 13: 1-3; Gal. 2: 20; 1
John 1: 7.

Common Scripture Passages
1. Now faith is assurance of things
hoped for, a conviction of things not
seen.

2. For therein the elders had witness
borne to them.
3. By faith we understand that the
worlds have been framed by the word

9. By faith he became a sojourner in
a land of strangers, as in a land not
his own, dwelling in tents, with Isaac
and Jacob, the heirs with him of the
same promise.

10. For he looked for the city which
hath the foundations, whose builder
and maker is God.

11. Therefore let us also, seeing we
are compassed about with so great a
cloud of witnesses, lay aside every
weight, and let us run with patience
the race that is set before us.

12. Looking unto Jesus, the author
and perfecter of our faith, who for
the joy that was set before him
endured the cross, despising shame,
and hath sat down at the right hand
of the throne of God.

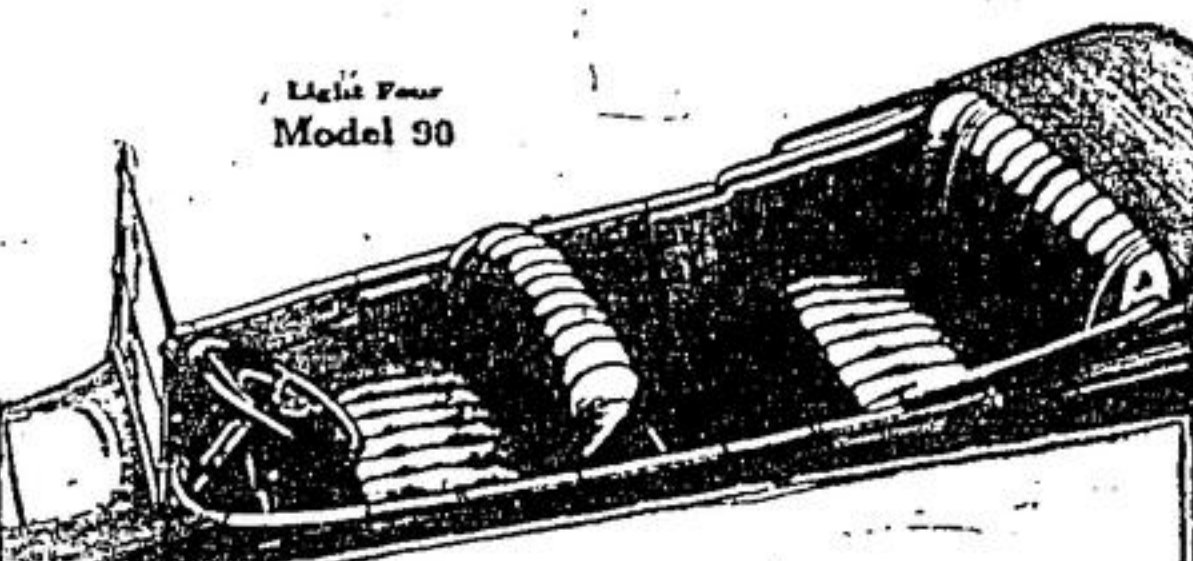
