WHY IS HOME GROWN CLOVER GROWING DERTY?

The Dominion Experimental Farms system has for years conducted an experiment in clover growing. Red clover seed on the ground that heavier and more reliable crop may be expected from the home-grown seed than from seed imported from some other country.

The superiority of Canadian-grown red clover seed has been demonstrated over and over again, and, as a result, many progressive farmers prefer to use imported seed, and believe its superior value, raise the red clover seed themselves rather than take a chance of getting unsatisfactory seed.

In order easily to understand why the home-grown seed is superior to the imported article, it should be remembered that there is not a single pound of red clover seed ever marketed which can be said to represent a distinct variety. In fact, every pound of red clover seed sold in Canada represents a mixture of a large number of varieties, and it is only by accident that we can assume that all the seeds in a given bag are of the same variety. We've watched Acton keep stride with other towns of the same size and area, and have been pretty progressive in everything but waterworks and right there we see the difference between us. Every time I heard conversation on the subject it generally ended with, "Where are we going to get our water supply?" I know we're high and dry, but they didn't say what we had to do at the table."

Here is where the name of home-grown red clover comes in for it is to be noted that the Canadian clover field from which a large percentage of the tender types have been eliminated through the winter, our own country, by the winter, is bound to produce a hardy and consequently more reliable and more remunerative crop than any imported seed which may contain a mixture of both hardy and tender types. There is also a certain amount of winter-killing going on, the result of course being that the greater percentage of tender types of clover are now in greater the winter-killing. On the other hand, the plants which come through the winter may be considered to represent a stock much harder than the older mixture of hardy and tender types.

The late Arch. McTavish operated a tailoring business for a number of years. Mr. McTavish owns the property and Mr. W. Kelly has a new business in the store there.

This is the history of that section of Mill Street, which perhaps was the scene of the most tragic happening in Acton's history.
