Is Now at Work

It is an Impressive Gathering from Every Province of Canada in its 1,111 Delegates

NEW LEADER TO BE CHOSEN TO-DAY

Ottawa, August 6-Organization of the National Liberal Convention for the transaction of its business was completed at its opening cossion yesterday. Proceedings were consequently of a purely preliminary character. Questions of a controversial nature did not obtrude themselves publicly, and apparent unity and enthusiasm prevailed. Divergent views with respect to the political platform to be erected for the Liberal party in Canada have so far found expression only in the Resolution Committee, just constituted. and in the meetings of Provincial delegations, and the diversity of opinion with respect to the leadership has not shown itself in the convention hall. Unquestionably the gathering is an mpressive one. Delegates from every province of the Dominion, with a total by provinces in the great flagauditorium of Howick Hall. The 361 delegates from Ontario occupied the scats to the right of the platform, and the 294 from the Province of Quebes were placed on the left.
