And any claim for interest on the said estate, or any other claim, must be presented on or before the 15th day of September, 1919, the said day of September, 1919, the said Administrator will proceed to distribute the assets of the said deceased, and he will not be responsible for any claims or debts which shall not have been received notice at the time for such distribution.
