report that the estimated cost of the Reservoirs, Pumps and Pump-house, supply line, and land in connection therewith, will be the sum of \$40,000. And whereas the Council deems it expedient that waterworks system be installed and that the cost thereof shall be borne by the Corporation generally and that the remaining portion of the waterworks system, namely; the distribution of piping shall be constructed in the manner provided by the
