An Association for Halton-Dufferin O. S. Battalion

For the Mutual Benefit of all who Served with the Corps from Inception

MEETING OF REPRESENTATIVES OF ALL RANKS

Lieut. Col. Donnell and Officers of the 14th Halton and Dufferin Overseas Battalion, Canadian Expeditionary Force, have had in contemplation for some time the formation of a Battalion Association for the mutual benefit of all who served with the corps from its inception to the present time. The object of the association is to bring into the spirit of friendship which prevailed throughout all ranks during the period of organization, training and war service overseas.

The convening of a meeting for the purpose of an interchange of ideas regarding the proposed organization has been held in advance pending the return of members of the battalion from the front.

The majority of those returning to Canada having now been reappointed, notice of a meeting will shortly be given, when it is hoped a representative gathering of all ranks will attend, express their views and elect committees to carry out the details.

It is not to be expected that a full attendance of all ranks of the Battalion can be assembled at one meeting. Therefore, in order to give all members an opportunity to express their views, it is suggested that local meetings, in the various towns of the counties of Halton and Dufferin in which the Battalion was recruited, be called by the local officers or by the local Committees.

At these meetings local members of the Battalion will be given the opportunity of discussing the preliminary details of the object of the Association, which will be laid before them and suggestions as to the best way of carrying out the plan, which may be made to the central meeting.

It is pointed out, however, that any member of the Battalion who is at liberty, and welcome to attend the central meeting and it is hoped that all who are able to do so will be present.

A few of the suggested points for discussion are as follows:

(a) The forming of an association as suggested and electing a committee to carry out the details.

(b) The consideration of ways and means for assisting in adversity, dependents of members of the battalion who paid the supreme sacrifice, or others who may be in need of help.

(c) The compiling of local and central records for the purpose of keeping in touch with all ranks in order to assist members of the battalion who may be in need of employment, etc.

(d) The consideration of the erection of suitable memorials in the various recruiting centres to those who fell in the line of duty.

(e) The advisability of holding reunions of all ranks and their families from time to time, for the purpose of keeping alive the association and good fellowship so pleasantly formed during the active period of the battalion's existence.

(f) The publication of the history of the Battalion, and the names of those who were actively engaged.

(g) Ways and means of providing necessary funds for carrying on the work.

These, together with any other matters which may be brought up, will be thoroughly discussed. An preliminary meeting is looked for and it is trusted that all ranks will enter heartily into the proposition and that the result will be an organization worthy of the name and traditions of the 14th Battalion, and of the counties of Halton and Dufferin, in which it was raised.

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Military Relics from Palestine

Capt. W. G. C. Kerney, V. R. C., has brought from Palestine and Egypt some highly interesting relics which he brought from a photograph of a Bible taken from the tomb of a wounded British soldier in the hospital, who had been shot by the Egyptian. The relic is a leather cover and the scripture records as far as the 19th chapter of Exodus had been torn away by the enemy's bullet, and strangely coincided with the fact that the very first words which appear in the damaged Bible and the first words of the verse are: "The Lord, who hath delivered you out of the hand of the Egyptians." The wounded soldier recovered and was afterwards able to do his share in the taking of Palestine and Jerusalem. Capt. Kerney also has the secret copy of the Imperial Reserve Cavalry Brigade order from headquarters under the name of Albert, to him as Brigade Veterinary Officer, when the command was given to move from the camp at Tarse on to Jerusalem, dated November 11, 1917. Another document of historic interest is a lettered copy of a lecture given in Palestine, at the same time as the one given at Kaituma, Egypt, in April, 1919, by a general staff officer on "The Outlook for the Middle East." The lecturer in this interesting address says: "When nearly forty years ago, we came to Egypt, we did so against our will. We were engaged in a war with the Ottoman Empire, and it was believed that these could be accomplished within a few months. It is now nearly forty years have passed, and the British are still in Egypt, and are likely to stop there."
