The Council Considers the Damaged Factory

Will Have an Expert Inspector
Investigate the Damages
Sustained

The New Baptist Pastor

Rev. Mr. D. H. Dixie, Toronto, preaching at services in the Baptist Church last Sunday. Next Sunday, the new pastor, Rev. Mr. Johnston, will commence his regular pastorate.

A letter from John Gibbons com-
municated a clogged drain which had
been neglected.

The Streets and Walks Committee was instructed to look into the matter.

The by-law arranging for the annual election of members of the Council and School Trustees was passed.

Instructions were given to pay the salary of the trustee for the year, amounting to \$200.

It was decided to have the telephone installed in the committee room during the Victory Loan campaign.

The question of the damage to the shoe factory on Saturday last was considered. Mr. Macdonald, the contractor, being present.

Mr. R. J. Kerr, Clerk, accounted by J. Hall, that the Clerk secured the opinion of Mr. Ellis, Municipal Director, re the damage to the shoe factory; that there service of a government of the city, and that it would be necessary to thoroughly investigate the damage sustained to the building and repair, also that all estimated expenses and contracts between the Building and City Council and Macdonald should once procured and laid before the Council—Carried.

Mr. Macdonald suggested that if the City Council would sufficient to re-build the wall of the second story 12 inches in thickness he would do all other necessary work. He would endeavor to put the building in such shape as to put the new company desired it.

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Another Reception to Soldiers

At a meeting of the Citizens' Reception Committee on Tuesday evening it was decided to hold a public reception for the returning soldiers who arrived home since the last civic function, on Wednesday evening last, 10th Inst. There are seven or eight hundred men here now, and the reception will be held this week and was hurried to the Guelph Hospital.

The appearance of the wrecked factory would indicate that the smokestack at the north-west corner was first blown in upon the roof. This caused a hole in the roof, and the roof and wall and the wind then got under and lifted the roof. It is clear that the west wall and windows were broken in and partially crushed. It was at first thought that they were injured, but when the car struck the main tracks and would have struck the car end with the windscreen.

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The roof of the building, which is made of brick, is very strong, and it is believed that the glass in some whole windows remained intact.

The substantial character of the roof construction, which was covered with dressed matched flooring, is seen in the fact that the whole area went off, and none in sections.

The front entrance is on King Street, where the offices and whipping rooms are located, without the stable remaining.

John Gibbons, born farmed, died last night at 10:30 p.m. in the second floor fall networked over. His body was crushed like an eggshell and totally demolished. The impact of the falling chimney smashed through a solid brick wall, and the body of C. H. of 12x14 inches, which was carrying a section of the second floor.

Contractor Macdonald's carpenters were called out on Saturday night in full force to repair the damage to the building ready to go into the two-roomed stable.

Mrs. R. J. Kerr arrived home from West Hill, Ontario on Saturday after spending a month or so with her daughter there. She returned from the visit to her husband, who had not been home in Guelph Street, before returning to their home in Weston.

Mr. James Harvey, Jr., Kelowna, who was a guest at the home of his uncle, Inspector Harvey, Lake Avenue, during the week, Mr. Harvey has been ill for several days, and is now in a condition which makes him unable to leave his bed.

Mr. Harvey's wife, Mrs. Mary, and

daughter, Mrs. Helen, have been visiting him.

The new bridge over the Humber River, which was to be built at a cost of \$16,500, No. 16, will not be ready for traffic until next spring.

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
