The Shoe Factory Muddle is Now Subject of Law

Mr. Gourlay is forcing the Coun-
cil to take immediate action
for repair of building

TOWN'S BANKING BUSINESS BOUGHT AFTER

Council met in regular session on
Monday evening. Mr. Hollingshead and
Councilor Arndt presented a motion
that the town's banking business be
sold to the Bank of Montreal.

The Finance Committee presented
the fourth report and recommended
payment of the following accounts:

The report was adopted.

A communication from James E. Dunbar, solicitor for Mr. Gourlay, re-

quested that the Corporation not act reasonably with Mr. Gourlay, and that he could take action and get the money from the town and complete the shoe factory.

The letter also stated that this action would be undesirable to all parties and opposed the view that an amicable agreement had made by the parties.

The Council maintained that they

were not in a position of being able to have the building completed immediately.

A communication from Mr. J. H. Mackenzie stated that if the Council would not act reasonably, he would

have the town's banking business held over until the completion of the shoe factory until May 4, so would do his utmost to have the walls up, roof on and windows in by that time.

Mr. A. K. Graham of the Bank of

New York, New York, was asked to

give an explanation of why the communication offering a higher rate than had been previously paid by the town's bank had been received.

He said no objection to any action taken by the town's bank.

The Council maintained that they
