Notice is hereby given that all residents of Acton are required forthwith to clean their cellars, drains, privies, water closets, outbuildings and other premises, and remove therefrom all dirt, manure and other substances which may endanger the public health and to have the same completed by the tenth day of May next, on which day the sanitary inspector will commence a general inspection; and further take notice that the section of the Public Health Act prohibiting the keeping of hogs between the 15th of May and the 15th of November, except in pens at least 10 feet from any dwelling house, and 50 feet from any street or lane, with floors kept clear from all standing water and regularly cleaned, will be strictly enforced.

All citizens are earnestly requested to keep their premises constantly clean and thoroughly disinfectated.
