The Home of Temperance had a strong influence on the moral status of Acton and vicinity. It is an historical fact that the party members with their families for two and three generations were largely responsible for the temperance sentiment which has so largely prevailed here...

Of course, with a large membership at this early day, there were lapses among the members. Hotekeepers were prone to hit that members of the Home were "drinking behind the door"...

There were too many Methodist members on the board to look kindly at this forbidden pastime. My, how the night has fallen. A private school was held in the hall for a time by Miss Adams and some of the grandmothers in town to-day tell with a very considerable degree of pride that they were pupils of Miss Adams' school...

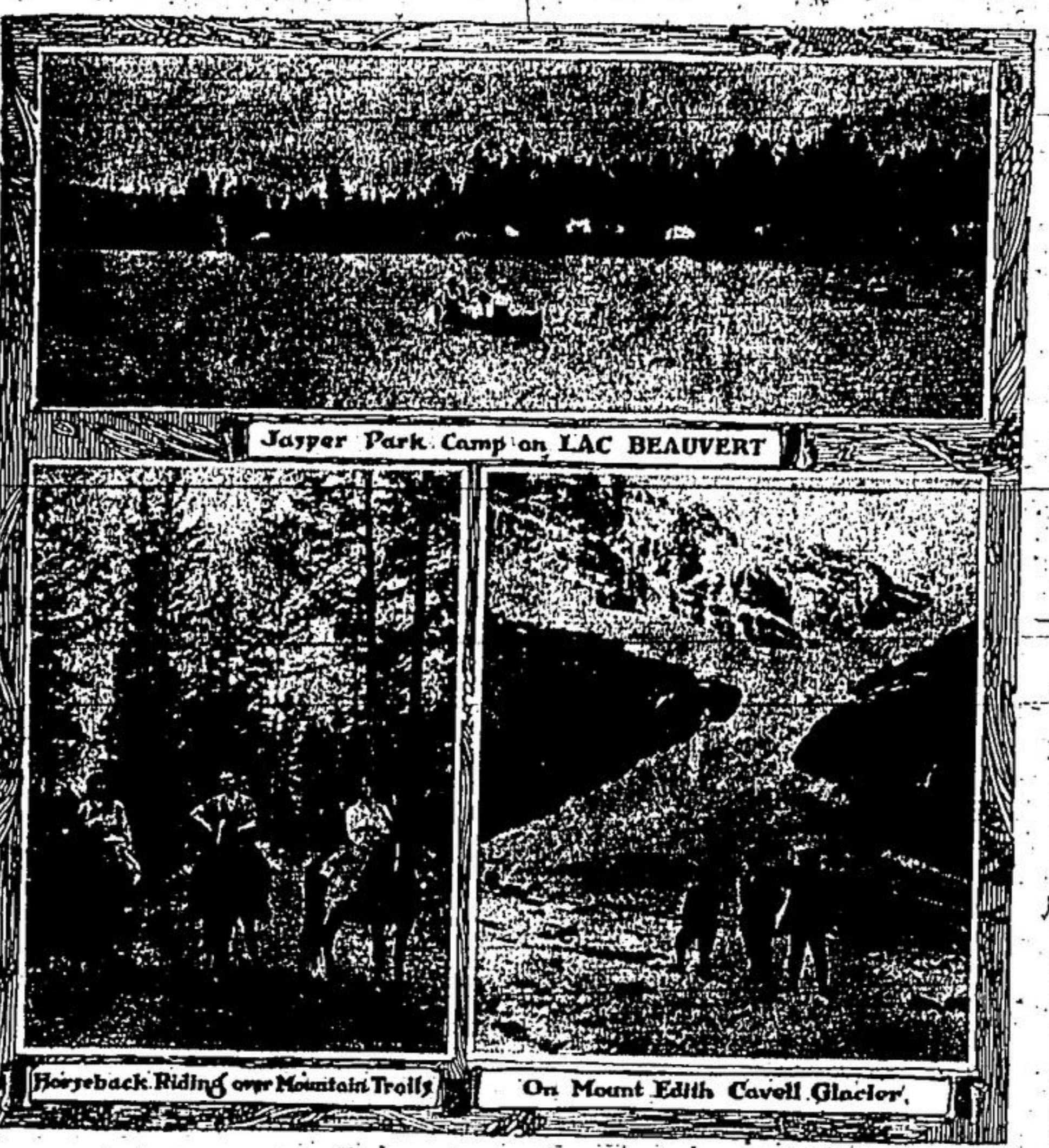
Here the Home prospered again, and had a very large membership. Here in 1873 the incorporation of Acton was effected. Here the first Council meeting was held, with W. H. Storey in the Reeve's chair, and Messrs. Asa Hall, John Speight, Dr. McFarlin and Charles T. Hill, as Councillors. And James G. Hill was the Municipal Clerk at a salary of \$75.00 per year...

Along in the eighties, the older members having passed away, and the younger people and modern politicians, more exacting the attendance at the weekly meetings of the Sons of Temperance began to decline. Employment was scarce and the attendance grew. An organ was purchased to stimulate the interest. Debates were arranged, and finally the Division became dormant. If I remember correctly it was under the regime of that enthusiastic prohibitionist, H. P. Moore, when he was the Worthy Patron that Acton Sons of Temperance finally departed this life. At any rate, Mr. Moore as the officer in charge who, upon authority of the Grand Division at Toronto, sold the Temperance Hall and lot to John Cameron, an equally enthusiastic temperance man. The purchase money went to the Grand Division for temperance work. Mr. Cameron converted the building into two comfortable homes, and during the past thirty-five years many families have lived here through joy and sorrow...

This ended the chapter of the old Temperance Hall. It is a coincidence that it follows the chapter recounting the end of the old California Tavern. P. S.—It has just occurred to me that when the Temperance Hall was moved from Upper Main Street to the Church Street site, several magnificent maple white trees, which grew on Mike Speight's corner, were offered to permit of the big building turning the corner. They were cut down under the promise by the Sons of Temperance to replace them with trees equally as good. Two or three spasmodic attempts were made to get down, but without success. How the erection of the double cement house, after by Mr. McKenzie filled the gap, and the loss of those fine trees is now never thought of.

Camping in Canada's New National Park.



THE Dominion Government in creating the Jasper National Park has set aside for the enjoyment of the people one of the loveliest regions in the Canadian Rockies—a territory studded with beautiful lakes, unswapped mountain peaks and gigantic glaciers. The area of the Park is approximately 4,400 square miles. The desire of the many travellers along the Grand Trunk Pacific line to stay over and inspect the beauties of the Park has led to the establishment of the Jasper Park Camp on the shores of Lac Beauvert. The official count of the mountain peaks to be seen from the Jasper Park Camp is one hundred and fifty. From the Camp, with its floored tents and big canvas dining hall, trips are made to the famous Maligne Canyon, to Pyramid Lake and to the top of Fitz Hugh Mountain. One of the more distant trips to be taken is to the foot of Mount Edith Cavell. This trip is made by saddle horse and in one of about sixteen miles. At the foot of this mountain nestles a beautiful lake, with a hanging glacier which has slowly moved down and filled the valley at the head of the lake.

THE "ISLAND OF THE SUN" IN TITIOACA

Lake Titioaca is the largest body of fresh water in South America and in point of altitude, is unsurpassed by any navigable lake in the world, being 12,000 feet above sea level. It has an average length of 145 miles and an average breadth of 245 miles, and the above lake being broken and full of islands. The average depth is, of course, 492 feet and in the centre, exclusive of the lake lies the "Island of the Sun," which came into being by a sudden change of position in the physical features of the lake.

Vessels, some of them 1,200 tons gross register, ply the inland sea which forms part of the highway between Paris and Bolivia, and the department of public works in Bolivia has recently appointed a commission of engineers to make the necessary surveys in order to connect Lake Titioaca to the town of Juli and Chacabuco, are rapidly developing, and there are also found artificial canals of the Empire of the Incas.
