\$2,117.77 for the Citizens' Memorial to Soldiers Collected

The \$2,500 Objective Is Easily
Within Sight for the Pro-
posed Monument

PLENDID RESPONSE MET BY
THE CANVASSESS

Dr. Gray, the Chairman of the Com-
mittee of Pivs, remarked when accept-
ing the appellation that were used,
"We are here to set the bar high,
not fire." The Committee met
promptly and proceeded with their orga-
nization for the campaign. The ob-
jective of \$2,500 was set, and the
people responded to the appeal.

A strong committee of citizens was ad-
vanced as canvassers. This Committee
met and organized and fixed Monday
evening to start the work.

Every canvasser named
accepted the position, and each was
promptly on hand to start out im-
mediately.

The result of the canvass was most
encouraging. Citizens generally showed
their loyalty to the memory of our
soldier heroes who made the supreme
sacrifice, and the public responded
with a very pleasing willingness to
contribute to the fund required to
erect a "citizen" memorial to their
dearly departed.

Over \$2,000 has already been sub-
mitted. A number were not at home
when the canvassers called. Those
will no doubt hand in their contribu-
tions, which will be acknowledged in
due time.

The canvassing Committee has not
been able to call upon the residents of
the farming district contiguous to the
town, and those who have done so
expressed their desire to have a share
in this memorial to our fallen heroes.

Their contributions may be handed to
any of the canvassers, and all
will be acknowledged with great pleasure.
