#### BRITAIN TO REGAIN LEAD

British Trade Commissioner Strikes

Cheerful Note in Toronto

It was a cheerful and optimistic assembly of men that attended the launch of the Canadian Association of British Manufacturers and their representatives in Toronto. Their optimism was the result of the opinion that British trade throughout the Dominion was even more coming into its own and would continue to do so.

The keynote of the conference was sounded by Mr. T. W. Price, British Trade Commissioner in Ontario, when he declared that "by the end of the year the United Kingdom will have regained its position as the first trading nation in the world."

After referring to the progress made by the Toronto and Montreal branches of the Canadian Association of British Manufacturers, Mr. Price spoke of the close co-operation between the association and the Trade Commissioners in Canada.

President, G. A. Marshall declared that the object of the gathering was to bring together in closer fellowship those who are carrying on British trade overseas.

Increase of \$11,181,016 for the First Two Months

Barker, of Guelph, says that the increase of \$11,181,016 in the Customs receipts for the Dominion for the first two months of the financial year, which ended to-day, as compared with the same period last year, is shown by Customs Department returns. For the two months of April and May, 1919, the Customs receipts were \$10,000,000, while for the same two months this year, they totalled \$37,160,708.
