

#### BEST OF FELLOWSHIP AND GOOD FEELING PREVAIL

Applications for the position of Chief of Police were resolved from Mountie Peter Hills and J. J. Cooney, D. C. M.

Mr. Cooney was present. He requested \$100 as retaining fee and a guarantee of as much as he had received in the treasury. He was willing to work at any task required of him in the town.

The Council considered that owing to the work that was required of Mr. Cooney, he should receive a salary and other matters. It was intimated to the Chief of Police on those terms.

The Clerk was instructed to procure application forms for installation of services of waterworks.

Moorehead's Chocolate Island Hails

The report was adopted.

Mr. John Leishman reported on the manner in which the shoe factory had been reinforced with iron in planks and corners built into the wall. He did not see how it could possibly be stronger.

Moved by John H. Lutz, seconded by M. J. Hazard, that the Clerk be authorized to pay Mackenzie \$700.00 for extra work in the shoe factory, per agreement, said sum to be paid from Debenture Fund.—Carried.

Mr. John Cameron was present and complained that he had already paid about \$100 over the cost of the sidewalk in front of his property on Church Street and accordingly to his agreement only half the cost was to be borne by him and the other half by the municipality.

For the past 25 years Mr. Ryan has had one of the leading dry goods merchants of the city. He is now in failing health for some time past and he went to New York last week to consult a leading specialist. The operation was performed on Wednesday, May 20, and he returned home Friday that evening.

Another by-law authorizing the borrowing of \$10,000 more for the work on waterworks was also passed by the Council.

Mr. Hedges was present to discuss waterworks details. He estimated it would cost \$5.00 for a tap and service and labor extra for a house pump.

He advised that all connections to be made next summer to be made by the contractor. Arrangements will be made with the contractor to do this work.

His communication from the Hydro Electric Commission authorized the following rates in Hydro power:

For municipality, commencing July 1, 1920, from June 1, the rate for consumers will be 7c per kw-hr, with a minimum bill of \$10.00 per month.

Commercial lighting, 6c., 30c., 60c., \$1.00, 2c., 3c., 5c.; street lighting, \$1.00 per year for 100 w. m. lamps,

and so on.
