ATTEND SCHOOL UNTIL 16 YEARS

The Scope of the New Adolescents School Attendance Act

In some quarters the coming into effect of the Adolescents School Attendance Act, as amended by Hon. H. H. Grant last week, is not thought to have the wide application that a reading of the bill indicates.

After September 1, 1921, however, every child, except those specially provided for, will be required to continue at school until he or she reaches the age of sixteen. This provision will apply to all children between fourteen and sixteen years of age, and who have not previously received instruction for at least 400 hours of each year. These children will be required to be established to suit the circumstances, in each locality.

The extension of the compulsory school age to sixteen, which does not come into effect until September, 1922, is not so general in its application. It requires attendance at school of children between sixteen and eighteen years of age, for 320 hours each year. There are several exceptions. If the child has passed his matriculation he need not continue the part-time course, and he is received a full-time education up to the age of sixteen, he is also exempted.
