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## To Our Subscribers

The largely increased cost of paper, ink and all other materials  
required in the production of a newspaper, renders it imperative that  
subscriptions and advertising rates be increased if the business is to be  
maintained. Numbers of old-established newspapers throughout Canada  
have been forced out of business.

In 1914 news print paper, such as is used by the Free Press, was  
\$50 per ton delivered; now it is \$110 a ton at the mill, with enormously  
increased freight charges added. Ordinary blank ink has more than  
doubled in price; ink colors more than three times what they did six years  
ago; wages in printing offices are more than double what they were  
in 1910. Another increase in the cost of paper is to take place on  
October 1, when the price will be \$130 per ton at the mill.

With these facts staring us in the face we are compelled to raise  
the subscription price of the Free Press  
TO \$200 PER YEAR ON AND AFTER THE FIRST OF  
NOVEMBER, 1920

Up to that date subscriptions will be received at the \$150 rate.
