## News of Local Import.

A Chair Concert

This will be done in the annual "Trufatival" which is to be held on October 18 to 23, when it is proposed to raise \$70,000 in a national campaign for the relief of widows, orphans, training of Canadian sailors, institutes, development of the movement and administration. Our proposals to raise \$450,000; Quebec \$100,000; Montreal \$100,000; Ottawa \$25,000; Prince Edward Island \$15,000; Nova Scotia \$10,000; Manitoba \$30,000; Saskatchewan \$30,000; British Columbia \$35,000.
