Waterways have always played an important part in the commercial history of the world and perhaps at no time more than during the late great war. Austria and Germany were able to transport a great deal of their war material by way of rivers and canals while to some extent the same might be said of other countries. At the present time in Canada considerable is being heard of the proposals to develop the St. Lawrence route as a joint enterprise between Canada and the United States, meeting with some opposition in both countries. A project which is contained wholly within Canada and which would be of great importance to the Dominion in relieving her railroads and in moving her wheat crop, is the Georgian Bay Canal, which would be a useful addition in the opinion of many business men to our transportation facilities. It would provide a means of transportation during a large portion of the year and would be of vast service in the transportation of much of our wealth. It would provide an outlet free from all international hitches and under purely Canadian control and would probably in time rank with the Danube and other commercial rivers of Europe.

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
