HOW TO BOOST ACTON
A Boy's Ideas of His Native Town and Its Attractions to Strangers

The following was the prize essay at Acton Fall Fair, written by Jordan Lawrence, who received Mr. J. T. Brown's special prize:

There is a most pronounced but highly mistaken idea prevalent to-day in the minds of Toronto city dwellers, that Acton is a rural place, is nothing but an endless variety of town-fences. It is far from the dullness of such a place that we wish to explore such false theories and show that Acton is a most important place their beautiful due.

Many, indeed, are the splendid towns in Western Ontario within a radius of fifty miles of Toronto, each one having its own particular attractions. But Acton is the subject of this writing, an splendid town, in a good farming area—about 25 miles straight west of Toronto and situated on the main line of the Grand Trunk as well as the Toronto and Huron Railways. Its railway facilities are adequate for all requirements of transportation from a manufacturing standpoint, as well as giving exceptional accommodation for travelling. Trains pass almost every hour, and the waiting rooms are spacious and comfortable. Its location is most fortunate, being midway between the two great cities of Toronto and London, and being only a few miles from the latter city. Its proximity to larger cities and its accessibility to the latter trade in Acton.

Acton's manufacturing are perhaps its most important features. The enormous plants of the Boardman Lumber Co. and the Boardman Paper Co. have made Acton famous. These two concerns have recently constructed their buildings throughout. Their equipment is of the latest type and is thoroughly modernized in every particular, making work for their employees of whom there are hundreds a pleasure compared to the average tannery. Messrs. Boardman have made a study of their employees' welfare in different ways. This is manifested by building them comfortable homes to be had at moderate rentals and giving them their families pleasant annual outings.

The fact that the heads of this important concern live right in Acton, may partly account for the extremely good feeling that has always existed between employers and employees. There are an unknown quantity in Acton.

Leather seems to be Acton's strong feature, for the next important industry is leather. There are two leather factories known as W. H. Storey & Son and Hoyer & Mowat Co. The products of these splendid factories are familiarly known from the coast to the western coasts. Their buildings are large and substantial and are equipped with power machinery. Their annual output of handgear far exceeds many city factories and gives steady employment to a large number of Acton's young men and women.

There is also another leather concern in the town of Acton, which will add materially to Acton's list of industries—a shoe factory. Occupancy at an early date is almost assured.

Very important are the schools. Acton stands second to none and in most cases are vastly superior to nearly every other school in the district. It has contributed so, largely to the different professions, and to the teaching of the children, gives ample proof of its superiority, and the untutored minds of the kiddies are the most material to work upon.

Acton is a healthy place, a healthy atmosphere and good moral training is given in the home, and it is here the children are first to be raised. It is so important a part, mostly and physically, Acton enjoys a clean reputation and altogether is a healthy place.

The streets are most attractive, most of them having unadorned drives and granite walks with beautiful flower beds. Some of the thoroughfares are somewhat dilapidated, but are in the process of being replaced by a new and better system which will, when completed, add greatly to its many advantages. The town has always had a clean reputation, and a modern water supply its safety will be assured.

Its well kept streets provide an ideal setting for the articles of commerce, which are substantially built. By this we do not wish to convey the idea, that it is a town of elaborate homes, but that they are comfortable and inviting, indicating peace and prosperity within.

Socially it is a good place in which to live, for there is little of that old-fashioned notion about being the "big town in the middle." Acton may be conservative practically, but socially it is strictly democratic. Equality has always been the key note of Acton society, making very few really rich, and having no paupers of which to be ashamed.

THE REASON WHY
When the lamp is burning without a chimney it generally smokes. That is because the oil which is coming up through the wick is being only partially burned. The carbon which is about one-half of which the oil contains, is not burned at all, and goes off into the air in little black specks with the gases which are thrown off. The reason the carbon is not burned when the chimney is off is that there is not sufficient oxygen from the air combining with it, as it is separated from the oil in the partial combustion which is going on. To make the carbon in the oil burn you must mix it with plenty of oxygen at a certain temperature, and this can only be done by forcing sufficient oxygen through the flame to bring the heat of the flame to the point where the carbon will combine with it and burn. When you put the chimney on the lamp you create a draft which forces more oxygen up through the flame, brings the heat to the proper temperature, and enables the carbon to combine with it and burn. When you take the chimney off the heat goes down, when the draft is still off, and the lamp smokes again.

The chimney also protects the flame of the lamp from drafts from the sides and above and helps to make a bright, clear light. It also keeps the lamp from getting too hot and prevents the lamp from being blown out by a draft of air.
