Guelph in selecting a collection of
books for the library. A very
large selection was secured and includes the
latest works in fiction, natural history,
biography, mechanics and juveniles.
A large number of catalogues
were examined and a collection was
selected for the library.

Hallowe'en Festival
The boys and girls in town had a
real treat this evening, the first time last year
they had a Hallowe'en. Hundreds of them
paraded the street in all sorts of dis-
guise. False faces, masks, "guled" pup-
ples, and fantastic facial pen-
cillings, to name a few of the younger ones.
The older ones dressed in costumes
of their own making. According to
these were their variety of costumes:
Dad's old clothes and mother's fancy
fashions. All played their parts. A
large number of the younger ones
thought of nothing but the fun they
had in dressing up. The idea of the
festival was to wear their soldier brother's
uniform. The youngsters were hole-
tonous, but for the most part respect-
ful. They came from house to house
and were rewarded with candy, popcorn, apples,
doughnuts and so forth. Moosecraft
was honored with calls from eighty-
seven of the young people during the
evening from 6:30 to 9 p. m., and no doubt
numbers of others in town had as many or more.

The Hallowe'en Festival

The monument had been erected by the people of Acton
and vicinity to honor the memory of the brave men who went
out to defend the small town against the rebels.

It will be unveiled with appropriate and impressive ceremonies on
Armistice Day, November the 11th, at 2 o'clock in the afternoon.

To attend this important historical event a cordial invitation is
extended to the entire community, to the soldier comrades of the fallen
heroes, and to their friends.

The monument is a massive structure. It is 7 feet 6 inches by 6 feet
wide—dark grey granite. It is built of four blocks of granite, each block being
carved and mounted and the face bears the names of the fallen soldiers and
the regiments to which they belonged.

The memorial is of gray Stanstead granite and the wreath sur-
mounting the maple leaf is a weather proof alloy of copper and bronze
from Canadian mines.

The site occupies a commanding site on Mill Street, in the
center of the town, on a part of the town of the Methodist Church,
which was donated to the Committee of Five for the purpose and dedicated
by the Church Board, with permission of the Conference, to the four
A. sodded terrace two feet high, and thirty-six foot square surrounds
the monument.

The work was executed and erected by the McIntosh Granite Com-
pany, of Toronto and reflects great credit upon the chisel and chisel
work of the men who made it. The granite is of the finest quality and
the design gives a massive and permanent appearance, and is within of an
artistic and appropriate style.

This splendid memorial, which weighs about twenty tons, stands
upon a solid concrete foundation six feet in depth. The value of the
monument as it stands is \$2,000.
