portant factor in the re-birth of China get a "working basis" for writing.

There are altogether thirty thousand characters, and each character represents a word, and each according adjective, or adverb. Now however, the language has been reduced to thirty-nine fundamental sounds, each with its symbol. It is no onger a life study to learn to write correctly, for an intelligent Chinaman can learn to write his language by the almple and unlettered folk can master it within three to four weeks.

The system has been devised by Chinaman, and the fact that there is nothing of the "foreign devilment" in it is, of course, a great recommendation to the Chinese. The vast proportion of the huge population of China are, for all practical purposes, illiterate: but with this new phoneile system of writing it will be possible to educate the entire republic within a COWS-Red and white cow, & years few years, and then may be expected stirring uneasily in her sleep.
